RIDING THE TIGER

This has something of an alarmist tone about it, and is exaggerated somewhat bearing in mind that only one river estuary is at stake.

However, if we let too many more similar projects through there could be disastrous environmental repercussions all over the globe. On the whole man has a most unnatural attitude towards nature.

He is the only animal who destroys, not just kills, without reason. That is unnatural.

Too often these actions are defended with cries of "progress" or "look at all the jobs we're creating".

Absolute nonsense. This is just an easy shelter protected by the system for justifying damage which could go on years after anyone writing or reading this is long gone and whose remains are mouldering away and are at last returning some good to the earth.

One fact that holds man apart from all other animals is supposed to be that he can think. Sometimes this seems to be nonsense too. If he could think, then he could see the damage he is allowing and in turn causing.

Animals destroy no more than they have to for their survival. They even clean up after themselves.

Men destroy more than they have to for their survival. They do not clean up after themselves. Just one look around reveals that fact. Elk Falls Mill betching vapour into the atmosphere and even worse, spewing poisonous wastes into Discovery Passage points that out. Men do not clean up after themselves.

The problem of course with all kinds of industrial operations is that they are already there. What do we do about them.

They cannot be closed down because of other kinds of havoc that might be caused. They can be modified and kept within certain restrictions certainly and in some ways this is being done already.

Act now save a fish estuary

Dear Sir:

May I ask a few questions of concern to the Campbell River and Oyster Bay

Are you patriotic? Do you stand up and sing "Oh Canada we stand on guard for thee"? If you do, do you mean it, or is it just lip service - a parroting of words without sincerity?

Canada is a beautiful country with a multitude of lakes, streams and rivers which provide not only a plentiful water supply but also give us unrivalled fishing.

The intriguing wonder of a salmon run where fish fight all obstacles to reach their spawning grounds that their species may live on.

Forests and woodlands turned into a fairyland of colours by autumns magic The beauty of a touch. dogwood tree, daisies in a meadow. Wild roses adding their beauty to this world around us.

Wildlife - the graceful deer whose spotted fawn asks only for a chance to live. Our grouse and ducks searching the swampland for food. Geese winging the pathways of the sky

The multitude of birds, from the majestic swan to the little chickadee all add beauty and life and pleasure to our surroundings. Even the lowly porcupine waddling his cumbersome way adds a little pleasure and humour to our day.

These are only a small part of the gifts God gave us. Must we destroy them, even as we destroyed his Son?

This estuary is a rearing ground for salmon smolts. Their main food supply is plankton in all forms. What effect will a layer of mud caused by original digging or later cleaning of the Marina have on the Littoral zone. which is a rich producer of Protozoa?

This area is a public park and is also associated with the Game sanctuary on the Experimental Farm is frequented by a lot of waterfowl which feed on the Eel grass and small crustacea. Should not this area be reserved as an extension of the present game sanctuary?

Few people know that the government is seriously considering financing half of the cost of constructing the breakwater Marina complex for Pacific Playground, the amount somewhere between two and three hundred thousand dollars.

The reason given is that it will provide shelter for boats in distress. How valid is this argument as opposed to the loss of fish and wildlife when you consider we already have Air-Sea Rescue?

Could this money be put to a better use? For instance a Public boat basin behind the existing breakwater at Iron River at Oyster Bay. The Salmon Point Marina already established needs a breakwater which could be built for a fraction of the

One thing we do know for sure! The rivers, streams

and lakes in this fair country of ours are gradually going, killed by a thing called progress. Either power dams, sewerage or industrial pollution are sounding their death knell.

When will we stop this destruction?

Think back in the history of man - at one stage of our development this bounty we enjoy may have been necessary for our survival. Now, with man's domination of earth the picture changes. This bounty is now in our care; we must realize this fact and act accordingly.
