Hundred march for peace, envir

It was a walk for peace and the environment.

Brandt's speech was followed by musicians such as Kevin Malcolm and Denise Larson who played guitar and sang songs about war and environmental degradation.

Adding to Brandt's comment on a human/earth relationship, Megan Rush, a teenager from Read Island, asked the peace marchers to, "treat the planet as those you love."

Island pointed out that world peace is not an easy goal to achieve.

"Peace is so much more than the absence of war," she said. "Peace making is an active process requiring a lifelong commitment."

This was the first time in four years that a peace march was held in Campbell River and according to the organizer, John Shaw, all went well.

the walk in Campbell River," he said.
