

River visitor



Rare visitor

An extremely rare visitor to this area pre-empts our normal River Person feature.

On Saturday, Sept. 19 an immature Little Blue Heron (Egretta Caerulea) was observed by Margaret Clayton and Isabelle McLeish along the Courtenay River adjacent to the Courtenay Sewage Lagoon.

It was identified as a Little Blue Heron by Dr. Jim and Betty Lunan. This bird of the Eastern Seaboard of the United States is an extremely rare visitor to the Westcoast, and is considered accidential, i.e. very, very rarely occurring.

Unlike the adult, the immature bird is perfectly white with greyish wing

tips, dull olive legs and with the pale bluish bill tipped with black.

In his Birds of British Columbia, Wayne Campbell reports the bird having been seen and photographed at Judson Lake near Abbotsford in 1974 and again in 1975.

Its occurrence in the Pacific Northwest is part of the bird's post-breeding dispersal and could very well coincide with the warming trend caused by the Greenhouse Effect or El Nino

Father Charles Brandt captured the bird on 33 mm film as well as on video and he also recorded its voice which he said was a "nondescript squawk".
